

²⁶ In the sixth month, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, ²⁷ to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. The virgin's name was Mary. ²⁸ The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favored! The Lord is with you."

²⁹ Mary was greatly troubled at his words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be. ³⁰ But the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favor with God.³¹ You will be with child and give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus.³² He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his father David, ³³ and he will reign over the house of Jacob forever; his kingdom will never end."

³⁴ "How will this be," Mary asked the angel, "since I am a virgin?"

³⁵ The angel answered, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God.³⁶ Even Elizabeth your relative is going to have a child in her old age, and she who was said to be barren is in her sixth month. ³⁷ For nothing is impossible with God."

³⁸ "I am the Lord's servant," Mary answered. "May it be to me as you have said." Then the angel left her.

There's an Invitation for You!

Our reading this week: Luke 2:8-16

This passage gives me great hope.

Is it kings, rulers, intellectuals or pop stars that God chooses to announce Jesus' birth?

Oh no, it was the rough and ragged shepherds.

Which gives me great joy in knowing that God announces himself first to us ordinary people (and to kings as it happens) so that we can, if we choose, to be a part of God's plan.

But we do need to go and see and believe. What would have happened if the shepherds had said "oh that was a lovely time of worship, with a beautiful choir of angels, and their message really spoke to me. I wish my family was here, they needed to hear that." And then simply gone back to their sheep and the inevitable sleep that follows?

They would have missed the point of it all, history, purpose and power all culminating in this one moment, God with us. God in action, God in the world, Jesus the hope of the nation and the savior of our souls has arrived, and they would have missed it and life.

If ever we have an experience of God, whether big our small, some quiet revelation, some beautiful outpouring of the Spirit... let's not just go back to what we were doing before, let's go see what Jesus is doing in the world, *let's be part of what He is doing*.

So we too can witness the presence of God, entering his world, just as the shepherds did.
