

1 Corinthians 12 12:12-20 New International Version

¹² Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³ For we were all baptized by^[6] one Spirit so as to form one body—whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. ¹⁴ Even so the body is not made up of one part but of many.

¹⁵ Now if the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. ¹⁶ And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. ¹⁷ If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be?¹⁸ But in fact God has placed the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. ¹⁹ If they were all one part, where would the body.

For this people's heart has become calloused; they hardly hear with their ears, and they have closed their eyes. Otherwise they might see with their eyes, hear with their ears, understand with their hearts and turn, and **I would heal** them.'

WHAT IS GLORIFICATION?

Glorification refers tot the final state of believers after Christ returns. Our bodies will be physically resurrected and we will receive a resurrected body which is, mysteriously, both spiritual and physical. Without Prevenient Grace we are in *bondage* to sin.

After Justification we are freed to from the *penalty* of sin. Through sanctification we are freed from the *power* of sin. At glorification we are delivered from the very *presence* of sin. In this glorified state we are able to experience the fullness of the original purpose of our creation! **Good News!**

This final state is known as the "new Creation" since the scriptures tell us that God creates a new heave and anew earth. In the New Creation, we will be engaged in all the kinds of industrious work and projects and inventions and building that we are involved with here, but with the presence of sin. Indeed, this is the great transforming fact about the New Creation. It is not a spirit-type existence where we sit endlessly on a cloud with wings of angel, as we see in the medieval artwork. We will not be standing forever in worship service that never has a benediction. Rather, we should see that all of life becomes an act of worship, and the absence of sin transforms the very nature of life and work.

(Money is like salt water)

A man was stranded on a deserted Pacific island for years. Finally one day a boat comes sailing into view, and the man frantically waves and draws the skipper's attention. The boat comes near the island and the sailor gets out and greets the stranded man.

After a while the sailor asks, "What are those three huts you have here?"

"Well, that's my house there."

"What's that next hut?" asks the sailor.

"I built that hut to be my church."

"What about the other hut?"

"Oh, that's where I used to go to church."
